In a widely expected move, President Donald Trump will at a executive order—or a series of orders—<u>aimed at dismantling</u>: <u>Education (ED)</u>, while also urging Congress to abolish it outridepartment, which was established by President Jimmy Cart 1980, due to the advocacy of NEA and others, has been a key public education rhetoric, as a candidate and now as president.

Since Inauguration Day, the White House has issued reckless illegal directives to destabilize public schools and target som vulnerable students. 


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Here are the key programs that would be impacted:

- Title 1, which directs money to schools with high concent living in poverty and provides supports such as reading speciass sizes, could be decimated if, as proposed in Project 2 block grants and handed over to individual states—without accountability or oversight. According to an <u>analysis by tamerican Progress</u>, 180,000 teaching positions could be 1 million students in low-income communities.
- Roughly 7.5 million students, or 15 percent of the student
